

> **Christmas Break** The parish office will close **Tuesday 24th December** and will reopen Monday 6th January 2020

Over the last three Sundays, we've been hearing about John the Baptist and on the part he played in preparing the way for the coming of Jesus. Today, on this last Sunday of Advent, a few days before Christmas, our attention is drawn to the person of Joseph. Just as in the case of John the Baptist, we hear about Joseph not for his own sake, but for the part he played in the birth of Jesus. We always need to keep in mind that when we hear the Gospels, their intention is not to give us facts about different characters, but to draw our hearts to faith, love and commitment to the person of Jesus. Today's Gospel is no different.

St Matthew's account of how Jesus Christ came to be born ends with the message that Jesus is the Emmanuel, which means, "God is with us." But just how God came to be with us began, according to Matthew, with a very difficult dilemma for the man Joseph. While St Luke pays attention to the role of Mary, Matthew focuses on Joseph because he knew that his largely Jewish-Christian community needed to hear about the birth of Jesus from the perspective of Joseph.

Joseph, we hear, is already betrothed to Mary which in the culture of the time, meant that he and Mary were already effectively married, though not permitted to live together. The dilemma for Joseph arises when he learns that Mary is already with child. Now, for probably most men of his day, this would not have been much of a dilemma at all. According to the Jewish Law, the woman would have been guilty of adultery, a crime punishable by stoning. And one can only guess that most men of the day would have gone along with this course of action.

But, Joseph is not one of those types of men. We are told that being a man of honor, he wanted to spare Mary both adverse publicity and, no doubt, a death sentence. So he decides to divorce her informally. This is what he believes is the right thing to do even though it goes against the religious law of his day that was far less kind to the woman concerned.

But then, we are told, God intervenes in this rather difficult situation. Joseph is told in a dream about the origin of this child and his future role as the Savior of the people from their sins. Joseph hears this message for what it is – God's will – and in faith, takes Mary to be his wife and raise Jesus as his legitimate son in his own family line. Joseph, who up till now has played no part in God becoming one of us, has now been given a role – he is to give Jesus not his physical birth, but his social birth, his legitimate place as a member of his family and society. This was crucial because without it, Jesus would not have been able to fulfill his future role; he would have had no acceptance in the eyes of the people if he were not also an accepted member of a family.

So Joseph, like Mary, is someone who does not simply follow the rules, or what others might tell him, or the customs of his day. Rather, he hears God's voice in his life, takes this to heart, allows it to form his conscience, and then acts accordingly. He does this even at his personal cost. He sacrifices his own desires for the sake of what in faith, he sees to be God's desire for him. Joseph does not seek to be the star of the show, but a link in the chain that will allow God's work to unfold for the good of the world. In so doing, he plays his part in allowing Jesus to be born and live among us. Let's remember that, like Mary, Joseph is like us - he is made of the same stuff as we are. Can any of us hope to do any more that what he did? Can we, like Joseph, agree to play our part, no matter how small it may sometimes appear to be, so that we too can be links in the chain of the unfolding story of God-with-us, a story that continues to be told today, and which will continue long beyond our time.

How Did Francis of Assisi Begin the Christmas Nativity Scene Tradition?

Up until Francis set up the first nativity scene in 1223, people celebrated Christmas primarily by going to Mass (a worship service) at church, where priests would tell the Christmas story in a language that most ordinary people didn't speak: Latin. Although churches sometimes featured fancy artistic renditions of Christ as an infant, they didn't present any realistic manger scenes. Francis decided that he wanted to make the extraordinary experiences of the first Christmas more accessible to ordinary people.



Francis, who was living in the town of Greccio, Italy at the time, got the Pope's permission to proceed with his plans. Then he asked his close friend John Velita to loan him some animals and straw to set up a scene there to represent

Jesus Christ's birth in Bethlehem. The nativity scene could help people in the area imagine what it may have been like to be present on the first Christmas long ago, when they came to worship at Christmas Eve Mass in December 1223, Francis said.

The scene, which was set up in a cave just outside Greccio, featured a wax figure of the infant Jesus, costumed people playing the roles of Mary and Joseph, and the live donkey and ox that John had loaned to Francis. Local shepherds watched over their sheep in nearby fields, just as shepherds in Bethlehem had watched over sheep on the first Christmas, when the sky suddenly filled with angels who announced Christ's birth to them.

During the Mass, Francis told the Christmas story from the Bible and then delivered a sermon. He spoke to the people gathered there about the first Christmas and the miraculous impact that placing their faith in Christ, the baby born in a simple manger in Bethlehem, could make in their lives. Francis urged people to reject hatred and embrace love, with God's help.


