# 4th Sunday in Ordinary Time - 30th January 2022 (YEAR C)

### Reflection ...

At the end of today's Gospel we hear how Jesus' hometown crowd were so outraged by his words that they wanted to throw him off a cliff. How things have changed! These days many young adults tie a rope around their ankles and willingly hurl themselves from any precipice available!

It seems that some young people enjoy the challenge of facing down their fears, trusting the generally good track record of those who have done it before them and publicly showing their courage, even to the brink of death. Those of us not courageous or stupid enough to attempt a bungee jump have to concede that to do it, for whatever reason, is heroic stuff.

Heroic stuff is at the heart of today's readings. Even though the crowd hated what they heard, Jesus preached boldly to his own people. Jeremiah was similarly courageous in his teaching, in the face of enormous persecution from his people. And Paul knows the only reason one can endure hardships and rejection and even be seen as stupid in the eyes of the world is for the sake of love.

The word 'love' has to be one of the most misused words in our language. We say we love our house, holiday, car, and even ice cream. But using love in this way, we scarcely come close to what Christian love is all about.

St Paul teaches today that love is not primarily about warm fuzzy feelings and violins. Paul knew that Christian love is an intensely practical business. There is no point in any of us saying we love anyone unless our actions follow the profession we make.

Indeed as St John was to sharply say in his letter in the New Testament, 'If you say you love God and hate your neighbour, you are a liar'. We can say the right words about loving God and each other all we like, but if we do not show it in how we live, then we are noisy gongs and clanging cymbals.

There is no getting around it: Christian love always and everywhere involves sacrifice.

So, how can we love like this? Why should we love like this?

We can love sacrificially because other people have loved us in the same way. When anyone has been gentle, kind and patient with us, when they did not insist on their own way, were not irritable, resentful or enjoy our downfall, we were on the receiving end of love. They showed us how to do it. That's love.

We can take this enormous gamble to love like this only when others have loved us enough to tell us the truth about ourselves and we in turn have spoken the truth to them. That's love.

And we can plunge into the unknown, even to the brink of death, because along with others we have held on to hope in the face of difficult times. That's sacrificial love and that is what Christian love is all about.

Jesus does not promise us in the Gospel that any of this is going to be easy, just necessary if we are going to live life to the full. And we also have legions of companions who have been down this road before us.

From Jeremiah to Jesus to Paul to the martyrs and saints and to our own families, we know that it is possible to face down our fears, trust the track record of those who have done it before us, publicly show our courage, even to the brink of death and leap into the future with only three ropes tied to our ankles.

On one is written 'faith'. On the second is written 'hope' and on the third and strongest rope is written 'love'.

Let's pray in this Eucharist, then, for the grace to be foolish in the eyes of the world and heroic in the courage it takes to love others sacrificially, and be loved by them, even to the point of death.

# Brisbane Northside Perpetual Eucharistic Adoration

Our Kedron Parish has joined six other parishes on Brisbane's Northside to offer Perpetual Eucharistic Adoration 7 days a week, 24 hrs a day, thus enabling people to participate in this age-old spiritual practice.

Each parish is taking responsibility for one day a week. At Little Flower Church, we will offer Adoration from the end of the Thursday 8.00am Mass through to the start of the Friday 8.00am Mass.

To do this, we need people who can be present for one (or more if they wish) of the hours from Thurs 9.00am - Fri 8.00am. For reasons of safety and security, particularly during the night hours, we will always roster two people per hour.

It would be of great help if you could come at the same time each week, thus helping you develop this spiritual discipline of an hour with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. It also makes rostering easier, but we understand that personal circumstances change, so you can also let the Roster Co-ordinator know when you can't attend your hour, in time for him to find a replacement.

In addition to the rostered volunteers helping us keep the church open, anyone is of course very welcome to come any time during the 24 hours to spend whatever time they wish in prayer.

This opportunity for Adoration shared among parishes is just one way we can be a praying Christian community in the midst of society. In these times of uncertainty, when our lives are filled with activity, we need more than ever to find that quiet place within us where God is always present and waiting for us. Jesus is always inviting us and waiting for our acceptance and willingness to "just be" in His presence.

If you would like to register as a Roster Volunteer or find out more, please contact the Parish Office, or Fr Mario on 0429 600 711, or **Ross Musumeci on 0408 781 929 who is our Little Flower Church Roster Co-ordinator.** He will be your first contact person once you are on the roster.

We hope to start when we have enough people to cover the 24 hours. More details will be announced as we get closer to the starting date.

As you are no doubt aware, Tonga has been cut off from the rest of the world following a violent underwater volcano eruption on 15 January that triggered tsunamis, destroyed telecommunications and blanketed

There are reports that some coastal communities in Fiji and Vanuatu have been damaged by large waves. Tsunami warnings were also issued across the Pacific, Australia, US and Japan.

Caritas Australia are currently working to restore communications with our local partners to assess the situation on the ground and determine the most urgent needs. The volcanic ash is hampering emergency flights into the country and the damage to telecommunications infrastructure has made it difficult to get in contact with affected communities. There are fears that the volcanic ash and saltwater inundation from the tsunami waves may contaminate drinking water and threaten the health and safety of vul-

nerable communities.
