1st Sunday of Lent—26th February 2023 (YEAR A)

It is Written

Our Lord had a great mystical experience at his baptism. What was His reaction going to be? Perhaps to set up a monastery like the Essenes who produced the Dead Sea Scrolls? Perhaps straight back to the workshop at Nazareth?

No. Listen to what happened. Jesus was driven by the Holy Spirit into the wilderness, into the wasteland on the margins of society. And there the Devil was waiting to put him to the test.

What was the test? As we know, three devilish possibilities were offered to Christ.

Jesus was offered three shortcuts:

First. When He was hungry, bread out of stones. That was the offer of miraculous powers for self-interest, using exceptional powers to satisfy His own cravings.

Secondly, when He needed to take risks, angels to keep him safe. That was the offer that the ordinary rules of gravity would be suspended just for Him! He could even jump off the Temple roof and land safely!

Thirdly, when He wanted to change the world, absolute political power. That was the offer of dia-bolical power, which would continue the historical cycle of division and violence.

They were the Temptations of Christ.

And His answer? 'I will persevere in the *ordinary* way, believing that what was revealed in a special way at my baptism *is* true. I am precious and loved by my Heavenly Father.

I don't need special demonstrations of that. I just need to integrate that belief into everything I do, everything that happens to me.

Each of *us* at our baptism heard the same words as did Christ. In the depths of our hearts, at the core of our emerging personalities, we heard,

'You are my beloved son.' 'You are my beloved daughter.' 'In you I am well pleased.'

But, as with Christ, this will not insulate us from the difficulties and hardships of persevering and trying to live with those words guiding us on the journey.

Which means that you and I can expect, have experienced, Temptations. During Lent, we can keep an eye out for these situations.

One, we want the whole world to change to satisfy us (stones into bread), or

Two, we want to take stupid risks and come out unscathed, (jumping off the Temple roof), or

Three, we want to exercise power over others in a divisive way (dia-bolical power).

If you or I are tempted to sin in any respect, it will bear the marks of part, or all, of this three-fold pattern.

So, what is in this episode which makes it Gospel for us?

How can we try to persevere in following Jesus without the shortcuts of the fantasy world which the Devil may offer?

Perhaps we need to be realistic. Habits die hard. There is not likely to be an overnight change of outlook or action. It may be the task of a lifetime.

But it cannot happen without some familiarity with the Scriptures. Jesus resisted each temptation with: 'It is written'.

The forty days of Lent are a perfect opportunity to tackle some study of Scripture, to become familiar with the episodes and pattern of the life of Jesus Christ. And then we simply try to imitate Christ.

This is evidently the case with Pope Francis, seen in washing the feet of prisoners, kissing a disfigured man, inviting homeless men to his birthday breakfast. Each episode mirrors a Gospel passage: 'It is written'.

This gives authenticity to his mission to spread the Gospel. As Pope Francis says in *The Joy of the Gospel* (264) 'The best incentive for sharing the Gospel comes from contemplating it with love, lingering over its pages and reading it with the heart.'

Not that Francis is consciously mimicking a script. He has absorbed the life of Christ so that he is quite naturally imaging the scripture.

Find what is written. Imitate what you find. That is how the devil is defeated.

Did you Know???

Many of us are aware of the Tau Cross and its significance to Franciscans. Did you know that St Francis adopted the Tau Cross as his own. St Francis loved the symbol so much that he used it as his signature in the later years of his life.

The Tau is the last letter of the Hebrew alphabet – like the omega of the Greek alphabet. The earliest reference of the Tau is from the prophet Ezekiel 9:4 – "Go through



the city of Jerusalem and put a Tau on the foreheads of those who grieve and lament over all the detestable things that are done in it." In 1215, Pope Innocent III opened the fourth Lateran Council by saying: "We are called to reform our lives, to stand in the presence of God as righteous people. God will know us by the sign of the Tau marked on our foreheads.

Francis was present for part of the Fourth Lateran Council, and perhaps his devotion to Tau came from the call of Pope Innocent. But more personally, it came from his involvement with the lepers in areas around his home in Assisi. The Antonians were a community of men that existed in Francis' time, whose chief ministry was the care of lepers. On their habit they wore the Tau Cross, representing their fidelity to the passion of Christ and their devotion to serve the least of his brethren. Francis worked with the Antonians in caring foe lepers and this was probably his first introduction to the Tau. In Francis' mind and heart devotion to the Tau was devotion to the cross and to the person of Jesus. It was a symbol of conversion and redemption; and so it remains today for birth vowed and secular Franciscan throughout the world.

The habit of Franciscans are full of deep an rich symbolism manifesting their particular charism. Consisting of a simple brown hooded robe, and a cored rope cincture worn around the waist. The rope symbolises being girded with Christ and is tied in the three characteristic Franciscan knots that signify the vows of poverty, chastity and obedience. Each know has five coils with represent the five wounds of Christ.

Many Catholics carry their own symbols each having a special meaning: rosary beads holy medals or holy cards. All have an important symbolism to their owners, helping them come closer to God. What symbols do you hold dear and carry with you?
