Reflection...

Jesus and Satan have an argument as to who is the better computer programmer.

Eventually they agree to hold a contest with God as the judge. They set themselves before their computers and begin. They type furiously for several hours; lines of code streaming up the screen. Seconds before the end of the competition, a bolt of lightning strikes and takes out the electricity. Moments later, the power is restored, and God announces that the contest is over. He asks Satan to show what he has come up with. Satan is visibly upset, and cries, 'I have nothing! I lost it all when the power went out.' 'Very well, then,' says God, 'let us see if Jesus fared any better.' Jesus enters a command, and the screen comes to life in vivid display, the voices of an angelic choir pour forth from the speakers. Satan is astonished. He stutters, 'But how? I lost everything, how can Jesus' program be intact?' God chuckles and says, 'Ah – because Jesus saves.'

On this final Sunday of Advent the Church moves our gaze to the Annunciation. The whole scene hinges around one word: 'Yes.' Mary's fiat sets in motion the entire Christian drama. In his film *Jesus of Nazareth* Franco Zeffirelli pictures the Annunciation this way: Mary is asleep at night when a gust of wind opens a high window. Afraid at all the commotion Mary gets up and starts to pray. As she prays, we see her face change and her body bend over. With tears in her eyes, Mary looks up through the window to the moonlit sky and simply says, 'Yes'. The swirling wind dies down at once.

In recent years successive popes have reminded us that the best devotion to Mary is one that leads us to do what she did: say 'yes' to Jesus. Mary is not a stop on our journey of faith; she is a guidepost that always sends us on to Christ. Mary does not save us, for we believe she needed to be saved by Christ as well. That's why she could say yes in the first place. Mary recognised the gift and the giver and became the bearer of God for the world.

In this final week of Advent let's keep reminding ourselves of this simple but life-changing fact: Jesus saves us. Jesus saves us from death. Jesus saves us from living lives devoid of purpose and meaning and Jesus saves us from ourselves.

We don't save ourselves. We cannot earn salvation by good works or prayers or penance. And, as difficult as it is to hear, we cannot save anyone else. That includes our children, spouse, grandchildren, parents or friends.

Our prayers, good works and faith are the responses we make to the salvation of Christ we claim here and now. And how we live is the way by which those we love will find the gift of God's salvation for themselves.

In the midst of this frantic final week before Christmas when so many other things can distract us from what this grace-filled feast is really all about, let's take a moment to join Mary in accepting into our lives and hearts the greatest of all gifts – our undeserved salvation, Jesus Christ the Lord.

The Advent Wreath ...

The Advent wreath is a Christian tradition that symbolizes the passage of the four weeks of Advent. It is a circular candle holder that typically holds five candles. During the season of Advent one candle on the wreath is lit each Sunday until all of the candles, including the fifth candle, are lit on Christmas Day.

Each candle represents an aspect of the spiritual preparation for the celebration of the birth of our Lord, Jesus Christ. Most Advent wreaths use three colors of candles - purple, pink, and white.

4th Candle (purple). The Angel's candle or the Candle of Love. The angel's announced the good news of a Saviour, God's only son sent to save us.

Sacramental Coordinator

Our Parish is part of the Catholic Archdiocese of Brisbane staffed by the Franciscan Friars of the Holy Spirit Province. We aim to be a prayerful, caring community in the spirit of St Francis, so that we may come to know more intensely the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. We are seeking an enthusiastic and committed person to coordinate the sacramental program where children and families can encounter Christ, be transformed by Him, and realise their call to discipleship. This is a casual position (approximately 10 hours a week) with flexible hours.

Main Purpose

The Sacramental Program Coordinator assists the parish priest in the organisation and delivery of the parish sacramental program and other liturgical ministries. The Coordinator will prepare and deliver information sessions, learning resources and liturgy materials for the sacraments of Confirmation, First Communion and Reconciliation.

Duties

Co-ordinate sacramental enrolment:

Liaise with the Parish Team & APRE at St Anthony's School.

Enlist the practical help of volunteers

Prepare all enrolment material.

Advertise in school, parish, web newsletters – as well as at all local state schools; and promote sacramental program on Facebook and parish website.

Send enrolment information to all Catholic families in Yr 3, Yr 4 & Yr 5.

Liaise with parents and attend to day-to-day sacramental queries. Issues of a pastoral nature are to be discussed, as appropriate, with the Parish Priest or school staff.

Order sacramental materials i.e. booklets, stationery, medals, certificates etc.

Prepare and print certificates and celebration booklets for each sacrament.

Prepare sacramental celebrations/Masses in liaison with the Parish Priest, office manager and volunteers.

Prepare PowerPoint slideshows for sacramental celebrations

Maintain Sacrament data base on PACS

Prepare, organise and deliver materials for Parent Preparation Sessions

Prepare, organise and deliver materials for Family Workshops

Prepare, organise and deliver materials for Confirmation and First Eucharist retreats Coordinate volunteers to assist in the celebration of the Sacraments and organise celebration afterwards

Attend training where relevant.

Attend at all sacrament celebrations, including weekend Masses if applicable.

- An understanding of parish life, liturgy, and the sacraments.
- An understanding of and commitment to the Mission and Vision of the Catholic Church.
- Knowledge and experience in a Catholic context including integrating children and families into the broader church community.

- Highly developed organizational skills and interpersonal communication skills.
- Computer skills basic knowledge and experience in the Microsoft Office and management of email communication lists and platforms.

SINGLE SUGGESTIONS @ CHRISTMAS

Spare a thought this Christmas and Holiday Season for family and/or friends who live alone and/or fit the marital status of `single.' Whether widowed, divorced, clergy, religious Sisters or Brothers, never married, homeless etc., people who are single (or live alone) do not comfortably fit the Christmas mould of 'family' - especially that promoted by the media.

Remember also people who are living in a family circumstance, but may be feeling psychologically alone, single, deserted or vulnerable. Christmas is a time when the contented family unit of mother, father and child/children is proclaimed as the norm, creating a sense of displacement for many people who live singularly or feel alone. Individuals may be reminded of their own experience of loss - loss of family, spouse, children, parents, intimacy, love, identity, or the life they imagined. Regrets can take the place of Christmas celebration and people may feel out of place (or an 'add-on') at family gatherings as they watch each family unit within the extended family celebrate their own togetherness. People who throughout the year embrace and celebrate their single life can suddenly feel uncomfortable and profoundly alone. They may crave, albeit momentarily, the connection and intimacy of family. Some single people are experiencing their first Christmas alone and others have expended time and energy creating a Christmas experience to avoid feeling out of place.

Maslow (1943) clearly identified 'belongingness' as a fundamental human need. It is this need that can often create a sense of loneliness and superfluity at Christmas for single persons - whether at family gatherings, amidst the crowds at Christmas shopping forays, or anticipating and experiencing Christmas dinner in an aged care facility.

As people who care, let's please be aware of our own approach to family and friends this Christmas. Our gentle and discreet expressions of inclusiveness, kindness and understanding can make all the difference to someone's experience of Christmas.

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
